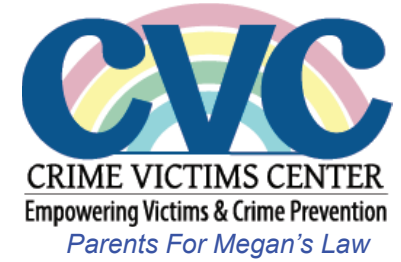

Who Qualifies for Services?

Victims of violent crimes can experience mental, physical and emotional trauma that can have a life long devastating impact. Support services can help minimize the impact crime has on victims by providing information and services which enable them to make informed decisions regarding their medical and legal options. Services are provided to innocent adult and child victims of crimes, certain relatives, dependents and guardians as follows:

Victims who were injured because of:

Assault	Kidnapping

Victims who lost essential personal property because of:

Services are also available if the victim died because of:

Burglary/Robbery
Arson
Motor Vehicle (DWI)
Motor Vehicle (Not DWI)
Other Homicide

What Kinds of Expenses Are Compensated?

Innocent victims of crime, certain relatives, dependents and guardians of the victim can apply for out-of-pocket expenses not covered by insurance or other resources.

The Crime Victims Board offers compensation related to personal injury, death and loss of essential personal property which is related to criminal activity.

The specific expenses CVB may cover include:

- Medical and counseling expenses
- Loss of essential personal property (up to \$500. including \$100. for cash)
- Lost wages or lost support (to \$30,000.)
- Transportation (court/medical)
- Occupational/vocational rehabilitation
- Crime scene clean-up (up to \$2,500.)
- Good Samaritan property losses (to \$5000.)
- Essential personal property expenses
- Burial or Funeral Expenses

What Services Are Available?

- Assistance in filing for New York State crime victims compensation claims which relate to personal injury, death and loss of personal property.
- Bilingual services.
- Crime Victim Board Advocacy.
- 24 Hour crisis support and mult agency referrals.

Multi-agency service referrals for:

- Individual and group counseling.
- Legal and medical information.
- Criminal justice advocacy including medical and courtroom accompaniment and post-sentencing support.
- Educational advocacy for minors.
- Assistance with preparation of the victim impact statement.
- Assistance with VINE registration.
- Information and referrals for concrete services, housing, long-term medical services, employment referrals, child support enforcement and social services assistance.
